- **Overall** topics of greatest attention, when responses to all three questions are combined:
  - 1. Informal spaces (especially the need for more student study space)
  - 2. Natural light/windows (appreciated, needed)
  - 3. Offices (corrections of deficiencies)
  - 4. Classrooms (wide variety of comments, esp. when combined with flexibility of furniture arrangements)
  - 5. Strong IT (broadly defined)
  - 6. Planning (both buildings, unity of campus, prepare for growth)
  - 7. Public display of art (appreciated)

The positive comments regarding the Atrium would reinforce several of the themes above, but were not incorporated directly into the weighting.

#### • By Question

- Get It Right: strong clusters
  - Informal spaces (for studying, collaborating, socializing), was the strongest cluster, by far.
  - The next two were strong IT and general guidance regarding planning.
  - Other strong clusters were natural light/windows, inclusion (accessibility, diversity, respect), and issues associated with circulation/navigation.
- Most Favorite and Least Favorite: weaker clusters
  - Most Favorite: the Atrium, by far, followed by light and public display of art.
  - Least Favorite: The basement (dark, cramped, airless) and offices (miscellaneous deficiencies) were nearly tied, followed by places without natural light and windows.
