- **Overall** – topics of greatest attention, when responses to all three questions are combined:
  1. Informal spaces (especially the need for more student study space)
  2. Natural light/windows (appreciated, needed)
  3. Offices (corrections of deficiencies)
  4. Classrooms (wide variety of comments, esp. when combined with flexibility of furniture arrangements)
  5. Strong IT (broadly defined)
  6. Planning (both buildings, unity of campus, prepare for growth)
  7. Public display of art (appreciated)

The positive comments regarding the Atrium would reinforce several of the themes above, but were not incorporated directly into the weighting.

- **By Question**
  - Get It Right: strong clusters
    - Informal spaces (for studying, collaborating, socializing), was the strongest cluster, by far.
    - The next two were strong IT and general guidance regarding planning.
    - Other strong clusters were natural light/windows, inclusion (accessibility, diversity, respect), and issues associated with circulation/navigation.
  - Most Favorite and Least Favorite: weaker clusters
    - Most Favorite: the Atrium, by far, followed by light and public display of art.
    - Least Favorite: The basement (dark, cramped, airless) and offices (miscellaneous deficiencies) were nearly tied, followed by places without natural light and windows.
