Mission: The mission of the Social Sciences Department (SSD) at Berkeley City College (BCC) is aligned with the larger College mission: to promote student success, provide educational opportunities and to transform lives. The Social Sciences Department (SSD) offers transfer level courses in multiple disciplines and these courses are structured to develop the skills needed to critically read college level social science scholarship, introduce students to the methodologies of the social sciences and to understand their own and others' lives in the context of social histories. Our courses and instructional goals reflect the values of BCC as a whole: academic excellence, commitment to multiculturalism and preparation for citizenship in a diverse and complex society.

Functions of the Program:

The SSD plays a critical role in students fulfilling their general education requirements, mentoring social sciences majors in transfer and ADT completion, and providing support for college-wide programs and learning communities.

The SSD at BCC offers courses that meet general education components for degree completion and transfer: IGETC (area 4, 3, and 5), CSU-GE (area B-2, C-2, D), UC-TCA (biological sciences, social and behavioral sciences). Outside of GE requirements and the degrees listed above, courses in the Social Sciences are embedded as requirements in the following degrees: Business Administration AA, Elementary Teacher Education AA-T, English Language/Writing AA, Global Studies AA, Liberal Arts with an Emphasis in Arts and Humanities, Community and Public Services AA, Social Services Paraprofessional AA. Outside of GE requirements, courses in the Social Sciences are embedded as requirements in the following certificates: Community and Public Services Certificate, Social Services Paraprofessional Certificate
