

Black History Month Opening Ceremony at BCC



Berkeley City College held its opening ceremony celebrating Black History Month on Monday, February 3. The sounds of drums echoed throughout the building as EOPS Coordinator Ramona Butler, along with family members Cyril Butler, Imani Butler, Tyehimba Kakayi, and BCC student played for the students and BCC staff, faculty, and administrators in attendance. Ramona then poured libations, honoring spirits, ancestors, and those who are no longer with us. Merritt College President David Johnson then delivered a keynote address, sharing the history of the African American experience and the American education system. President Richardson followed by sharing a brief history of how Negro spirituals emerged

from the experience of slavery, often serving as a means of conveying hidden messages. She concluded by singing a few verses from three well-known spirituals. The event closed with spoken word poetry from BCC student Tony.

Monday, January 27: Karaoke and Pizza Kick-Off

Welcome Week began with a high-energy "Karaoke and Pizza" event in the atrium. Over 90 students came to grab a slice of pizza. Lunch was catered by Alfred Brown from Laney

Cafeteria. While more than 20 brave students took to the mic to showcase their singing talents. The performances, featuring classics like "Bohemian Rhapsody" and "Killing Me Softly," could be heard throughout the building.

Tuesday, January 28: BCC Campus Resource Fair

The BCC Campus Resource Fair, held at the start of every semester, connected students with vital services. With 20 tables representing 15 departments—an increase from Fall 2024—

Wednesday, January 29: Relax and Destress

Mid-week brought a much-needed "Relax and Destress" session, offering students a chance to unwind from the stress of class add/drop periods. The event featured coloring, drawing, affirmational sticky notes, and soft jazz music. Attendees also enjoyed hot tea, hot cocoa, sandwiches, and snacks.

BCC's Mental Health Specialist and Clinical Supervisor, Janine Greer, along with her team of student mental health ambassadors, provided on-campus and off-campus mental health resources. More than 130 students took part in the event.

Thursday, January 30: Weekly Food Pantry with a Special Giveaway

The week wrapped up with the BCC Basic Needs Team's weekly free food pantry, in partnership with the Berkeley Food Network. 157 students, staff, and their families were able to get fresh produce and groceries. As a special Welcome Week treat, every participant received a free insulated BCC Basic Needs Center lunch bag—an exciting bonus that left some envious of those lucky enough to grab one!

Berkeley City College Student Documentary Featured at SF Indie Film Fest

"Meet Me In Chinatown," a documentary directed by BCC students Jerry Hsiao and Anna Sophie Loewenberg, was featured at the 27th San Francisco Independent Film Festival on Saturday, February 8th at the Roxie Theater in San Francisco. The film was submitted as a final project in BCC's Documentary Production and Editing class in Spring 2024 taught by MMART instructor Kelly Whalen. The film tells the story of Cynthia Yee and the Grant Avenue Follies, a dance troupe continuing the legacy of San Francisco Chinatown's golden nightclub era from 1940's to 1970's.

"I worked in film in China and moving to US, it was difficult finding my feet here." said Anna Sophie Loewenberg.

"BCC and this community of filmmakers has been a lifeline for me. Kelly introduced me to my co-director and creative partner [Jerry Hsiao]. Without BCC I may not have been able to continue making films."


"Local festivals are a great way for students to network with

On Friday, January 31, two of BCC's Basic Needs Student Employees, Lorna and Kei, visited a local K-8, Escuela Bilingüe Internacional (E.B.I.), to present about our Basic Needs Center and celebrate Lunar New Year!

Lorna, the Lead Outreach and Community Engagement Student Assistant, presented to the entire student body and staff, sharing her knowledge and experience of celebrating Lunar New Year in Malaysia. Lorna received countless questions and feedback from various students and staff members, all of whom greatly enjoyed her presentation. One fourth grade student even gifted Lorna a handmade poster which read "Happy Lunar New Year!"

Later in the day, Lorna was joined by Kei, the Lead Food Pantry Student Assistant. They took to the fourth grade classroom to present to the students about what the Berkeley City College Basic Needs Center is, and what they offer. Students were told about the various resources BCC students can access in their physical center, as well as the amount of knowledge and assistance that each of the student assistants are able to share with BCC students. They also watched some of the fun content the BNC posts on their Instagram!

After a brief presentation, Kei and Lorna prepared a mock food pantry, similar to the one that the Basic Needs Center hosts every Thursday in the atrium from 1 PM to 3 PM! Each fourth grade student got their own mock BCC student ID and was able to shop for various canned items and fresh produce. The students were able to use reusable bags, just like BCC students are instructed to do, and were taught the importance of sustainability and eco-friendly initiatives. After the activity was



completed, Kei and Lorna held a Q&A session, where they gave out Basic Needs swag to students who answered their questions or who asked thoughtful questions.

An important lesson that the students shared they learned was that there's not enough food and resources for everybody. However, they were also able to learn that there are various organizations and centers like BCC's own Basic Needs Center that are working hard to bridge this gap, to ensure students and community members are well fed.

Kei and Lorna had an amazing time at E.B.I. interacting with students, staff, and teachers and being able to extend their knowledge towards their younger community members.

Downtown Berkeley Association Meets with BCC Community Members
